### Wildlife Response Players

#### Professional Response Contractor

- Full time oiled wildlife responders
- HAZWOPER
- ICS
- Activated and contracted by FOSC, SOSC, wildlife trustee, RP

#### Local resources

- Local wildlife rehabilitator, veterinarians, animal control
- Credentials often unknown
- May deploy without activation

#### Any Wildlife Responder should be:

- 1. Permitted (Federal and State)
- 2. Experienced in oiled wildlife response
- 3. Specifically requested
- 4. Integrated into ICS
- 5. Regularly providing updates

## Kinder Morgan Terminal

- Alerted by NOAA SSC on January 23
- Contracted to Kinder Morgan as consultant to support operations remotely
- Local rehabilitators responded





### Wildlife Response Players

#### Wildlife must be integrated into ICS

- Safety
- Planning
- Resources
- Documentation
- Communication
- Financial







## Response Organizations



- There are a handful of professional oiled wildlife response organizations to be contracted
- Local rehabilitators are often first responders

## Wildlife Credentialing

- Most states do not specify "mass casualty" or oil spill response on permits
- Tri-State does not "certify" oiled wildlife responders
- Regulation is the responsibility of the wildlife trustees

#### Selection guidelines for a wildlife responder:

- Federal and state permits
- Documented experience responding to oil spills
- Liability insurance
- Adequate facility
- Proper safety training

### Response Credentialing



#### <u>Area of Response</u>

- Consider local resources

- Pennsylvania
- Maryland
- Virginia



#### Volunteers

- Over 35 pre-trained volunteers worked on this response
- 2-3 shifts per day
- Over 500 hours of service

Captured 37 birds in 6 days




# Caging



### Water Requirements

#### Often the biggest challenge

- Consistent hot water at 104° F
- 60 gallons of oily waste water generated per animal
- Approximately 20 gallons of clean water used during rinse



#### Decontamination

#### Ran 3 wash lines simultaneously



#### Media Interest



#### Release

#### 31 healthy birds returned to the wild



### Take Aways

#### Command should be familiar with:

- When a wildlife responder is needed
- Guidelines for selecting a wildlife responder
- Availability and capacity of local rehabilitators as first responders

#### Wildlife Trustees can:

- Ensure that state's permitting process is sufficient
- Help to identify local resources and dictate their level of involvement
- Oversee operations to ensure proper procedures are being followed
- Step in when issues need to be addressed

#### Responsible Parties are encouraged to:

- Engage a wildlife responder ASAP
- Establish a contract and financially support wildlife operations
- Visit the wildlife rehabilitation facility
